The Executive Committee of the ER-WCPT is now inviting MOs to nominate individuals for possible awards. Member organisations wishing to put forward a nomination should send it to the ER-WCPT secretariat info@physio.europe.org. Nominations must be received by **15th October 2009**.

The following criteria will be considered in making the appointments to the Awards Committee:

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- Individuals should be nominated by a Member Organisation; in addition the nomination may have the support of other MOs.
- **Criteria:** a clear demonstration of sustained contribution to the field of physiotherapy in one or all of the following categories clinical practice, education, research or service to the profession.
- Current members of the Region's Executive Committee are <u>not</u>eligible for nomination.

The selected individuals for the awards will be announced by the Executive Committee by the end of December 2009.

Swedish Presidency of the EU – Health Priorities

The Swedish Presidency of the EU started on the 1st July for a period of six months until 31 December 2009.

Sweden is taking over the Presidency in special circumstances. The financial and economic crisis has hit Europe and the rest of the world hard. At the same time, it is the Presidency's task to represent the EU in the fight against global climate change. In addition to this, the next six months will be characterised by institutional change, with a newly elected European Parliament, a new Commission during the autumn, and continued uncertainty surrounding the Treaty of Lisbon.

In the field of health, the Swedish Presidency priorities are as follows:

Promoting good health

The good health of EU citizens is extremely important. Preventive measures are needed. The negotiations on the **patient mobility directive**, which aims to increase patients' possibilities to seek out and receive health care and dental care in another EU country, is an important priority in the second half of this year. Other important issues to be negotiated during the Presidency are the conditions for the reimbursement of patients who receive cross-border care and the areas for future cooperation between EU Member States in the field of health care. Another important issue for patients is strengthening **eHealth cooperation** in the EU.



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The EU must be ready to deal with current health challenges. One such challenge is **antibiotic resistance**. The problem of bacteria that can no longer be treated with antibiotics is growing throughout the world. Without access to effective antibiotics common illnesses can become a deadly threat. The Presidency's ambition is for a decision to be taken on seeking out innovative ways to ensure the development of new antibiotics. The outbreak of **influenza** A (H1N1) will need to be dealt with during the Presidency. An expert conference will be held, at which EU communicable disease experts will discuss their experiences and the need for further measures.

Another challenge is counterfeit drugs. The Presidency will seek progress on the **pharmaceuticals package**, which includes pharmacovigilance measures. Another issue is the implementation of the **EU alcohol strategy**. The Commission is due to present its first progress report on the implementation of the strategy at national and European level. The ambition is to establish long-term prevention efforts for alcohol-related harm.

More healthy and dignified ageing

challenge and an opportunity for all EU Member States. The Presidency's aim is to increase the opportunities for **healthy and dignified ageing** for older people in the EU. To achieve this it is important to ensure that those working with health and social issues cooperate better and place the focus on the older person. The Presidency wants to find coordination and cooperation solutions and highlight good practices in different EU Member States. With this initiative the Presidency wants to put elderly issues on the EU agenda.

Important meetings:

- Informal ministerial meeting, Jönköping, 6–9 June. The first part of the meeting, on 6–7 June, will deal with alcohol and health, antibiotic resistance and eHealth. The second part of the meeting, on 8–9 June, will focus on the theme of reducing exclusion.
- Conference: Healthy and Dignified Ageing, Solna/Stockholm, 15–16 September.
- Expert conference on antibiotic resistance, Stockholm, 17 September.

The European region of WCPT has been invited to participate in the fifty-ninth session of the WHO Regional Committee for Europe to be held from 14 to 17 September 2008, in Copenhagen, Denmark. The Regional Representative, Emma Stokes, will participate on behalf of the ER-WCPT.

At the session, expected delegates from the 53 WHO European Member States will discuss about the following topics:



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- Protecting health in times of economic crisis: the role of health systems (including social determinants of health);
- Towards improved governance of health in the WHO European Region;
- Health workforce policies in the European Region (including a draft global code of practice for international recruitment of health personnel – a matter referred to the

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Regional Committee by the Executive Board at its 124th session);

 Implementation of the International Health Regulations (2005) in the WHO European Region.

European Parliament likely to build a

On 23 April the European Parliament voted on three important health policy initiatives: patients' rights in cross border healthcare, improving patient safety and EU strategy on rare diseases. These actions mark an important step forward in providing patients with better opportunities and access to healthcare in Europe.

The European Parliament also highlighted in all three health votes the need for enhanced cooperation between all EU Member States, in order to pool knowl¬edge and expertise to maximise health benefits for all.

- Patients Rights in Cross Border Healthcare:

"Europe for Patients"

The European Parliament confirmed the need for a legislative framework which clarifies the rights and conditions under which patients seek, and are reimbursed, for healthcare in another Member State. Many of the amendments sought to strengthen patients' rights through greater emphasis on providing public information on the quality and safety of healthcare.

- Patient safety and the prevention and control of healthcare associated infections:

The recommendation to improve patient safety in Europe and reduce healthcare associated infections was adopted by the Commission on 15 December 2008. The Commission's



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proposal aims to help EU Member States in one of the biggest challenges that the EU health systems are facing – unintended harm to patients while receiving healthcare. It is indeed estimated that 8%-12% of patients admitted to hospitals suffer from such harm.

- European action on rare diseases:

The Communication and Recommendation on rare diseases, adopted by the Commission on 11November 2008, serves as a prime example

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of where working at EU level adds value. It aims to improve the recognition of rare diseases and pool expertise, experience and research to maximise the effective use of resources to the benefit of all rare disease patients.
